In rural Guatemala, 63-year-old Ana Brito is one of 917 families committed to understanding the land she lives on and using that knowledge to create a better life. After joining a CWSsponsored food security program, Ana received a pig and learned how to grow and harvest foods like chili peppers, tomatoes, spinach,

radishes and beets. "They gave me seeds and I learned new techniques for planting and caring for the land," she said. Her dedication to learning and nurturing her surroundings has sparked a transformation for herself and her community. Because of caring CWS supporters, neighbors like Ana are building sustainable futures for generations to come.

Last year after Russia invaded Ukraine, 13-year-old Mark, his younger brother and their mother fled to neighboring Moldova, leaving Mark's father behind to join the Ukrainian army. They struggled to adjust to life in Moldova. For Mark, his father's absence meant he had little time to be a kid. He needed to take on more responsibility to help his family. After finding a CWS-supported educational center in Balti. Mark was able to continue focusing on his childhood by keeping up with his education and nurturing his newfound passion—painting. Your support gave Mark the freedom to have fun and just be a kid.

Responding to Disasters

Earlier this year, neighbors in Pajaro, California experienced severe flooding. Many in the predominantly Spanish-speaking neighbors in migrant community lost their possessions and didn't have the tools they needed to begin picking up the pieces. When you first meet Juliana, the first thing you will notice about her is her bright smile. Behind this smile, however, lies a story of abandonment and tragedy that began in Guatemala before Juliana was even born. Just three months before her birth, Juliana's father passed away. Shortly after, her mother, who was battling with grief and depression, began struggling with alcohol and abandoned Juliana. Juliana was left under the care of her grandmother who she grew up to call "mamá."

For about 16 years, Juliana lived in her aunt's home while her grandmother worked. Unfortunately, as the years went on Juliana began to experience emotional abuse and isolation, eventually being kicked out of her aunt's home and returning to be with her grandmother.

During the months she was living with her grandmother, Juliana met her current partner and became pregnant. She was both excited and nervous to have the baby. "I realized that if my grandmother passed, I wouldn't really have anyone to stay with other than my baby's father," she explained. Through this realization, and her determination to find a better life for herself and her son, Juliana decided to leave for the United States.

When she arrived at the border, she held onto her belly tightly and crossed the Rio Grande where immigration officials took her to the detention center to process her into the U.S.

In the U.S., Juliana went to live with her uncle where she, unfortunately, continued to experience abuse and neglect. However, she stayed focused and enrolled in high school. A couple months later, she was alone in the hospital giving birth to her baby boy.

The lack of support Juliana had become accustomed to would, thankfully, come to an end soon. Juliana and her baby began living with her mother-in-law who welcomed them with warmth and kindness. A few months later, Juliana's partner was able to join them. She excitedly shared that her baby said his first word shortly after, "papá."

Juliana and her son are now starting to live the life they always deserved.

In those same months, Juliana was also connected to CWS and began receiving support from her case manager, Jose. Juliana and her son are now starting to live the life they always deserved. She has been able to return to school where her teachers call her "la niña mil amigos," which means "the girl with a thousand friends." She is dedicated to her son and dreams of going to college to become a nurse, so that she can support other young mothers like her. She also hopes that her son will one day meet her grandmother who Juliana talks to almost every day.

Although Juliana's life may have begun as a lonely one, it will no longer be that way. And neither will her son's. She is now surrounded by a family who loves her, "thousands" of friends and CWS who is backing her up as she pursues her greatest goals and dreams. \bullet



Living a Generous Life

Generosity is a way of life for members of First Congregational Church in Columbus, Ohio.

The church's youth ministry is no exception. From serving in soup kitchens to walking in marches, the youth are determined to positively impact the lives of their neighbors.

Through their partnership with CWS Kits and Blankets, the youth ministry is putting their generosity into action. During a recent youth mission week, 16-year-old Henry Gillies was one of 14 participants serving the community by handing out kits and blankets to neighbors in need.

Henry and the entire youth ministry shared 230 kits and blankets with neighbors in Columbus.

A Warm Welcome Home

"We are like family."

These are words spoken by Mubarak, an Afghan refugee living in Danbury, Connecticut.

After arriving in the United States in March 2022, he feels a sense of love and belonging within his community, thanks to an unbreakable bond he

formed with the five women who ensured

his welcome home was filled with support.

Barb Davis, Maureen Devin, Barbara Wolf, Renee Bronner and Lisa Cambridge-Mitchell may have joined the Danbury Area Refugee Assistance (DARA) co-sponsorship team at different times, but they all are dedicated to supporting newly arriving refugees as they rebuild their lives in the U.S.

Because of them, Mubarak's life has transformed—he has a driver's license, a new job and is able to support his younger brothers who attend school

and work part-time. Mubarak even remembers a time when he became seriously ill and called Lisa, who took him to the hospital and sat by his side the entire night.

Co-sponsorship is more than a formal arrangement—it's agreeing to welcome a new family home. Now, Mubarak is passing on the skills he learned from his co-sponsorship team to support other Afghan refugees in his community.
