In the small rural village of Cunta, Doña Santos is inspiring change. Through CWS' food security program in Honduras, Doña Santos progressed from selling others' vegetables to cultivating her own land while preparing to launch her own local enterprise. After participating in CWS-supported training sessions, she learned how to improve the quality of her crops, use organic fertilizers and manage her income. Through perseverance, resilience and the support of compassionate donors, **Doña Santos is creating a legacy for her family**, ensuring they are happy and healthy.



13,181 individuals reached through CWS agricultural programs, including farming families in Latin America with agricultural training, seeds, and livestock.



165,174 individuals were reached with life-saving services after a humanitarian emergency or natural disaster.



96,404 displaced individuals, including asylum seekers, refugees and others, were reached with CWS services.

DISASTER RESPONSE



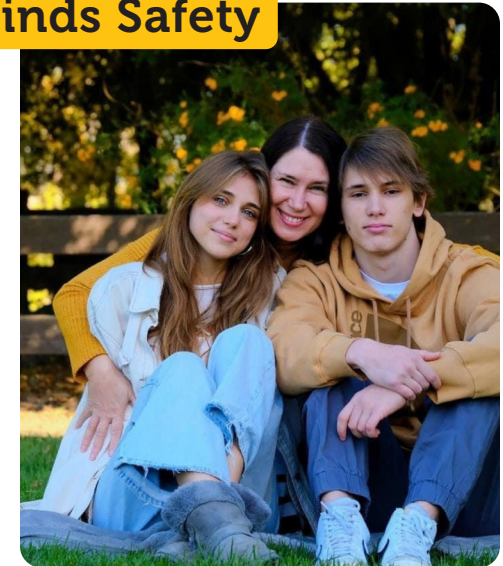

When war erupted in Ukraine, Tetiana, a devoted single mother of two, faced overwhelming challenges. Determined to protect her family, she bravely sought refuge in the United States. But her decision meant being separated from her college-aged son, who was studying in Poland. Tetiana's love for her children transcends borders, and she sought help navigating the complex reunification process. Thanks to support from CWS Northern California, Tetiana's family was reunited on American soil. **Your contributions enable CWS to walk alongside refugees like Tetiana** as they rebuild their lives.





CLIMATE RESILIENCE

Planting New Trees & Seeds of Hope

In 2018, due to ongoing conflict in the Democratic Republic of Congo, Ebocwa and his wife Nadia left their home and fled to Tanzania to restart their lives in the Nyarugusu Refugee Camp. Life was immediately challenging and Ebocwa was soon forced to make a difficult decision in order to support his wife and four children. With limited ways to earn income, Ebocwa decided to go into the nearby forest and chop trees to sell for firewood.

Ebocwa continued this practice, but he hoped to find a better way to care for his family. He explained, "We were living in a tent and I began wondering how I could build a better house for us. Finally, in 2021 CWS came into our village and invited us to be part of the agriculture program. CWS came at the right time because my life was very hard."

Soon Ebocwa and Nadia joined the program and began attending trainings on sustainable

vegetable farming, good nutritional practices and gender equality. While all of these trainings had a major impact on their life, there was one that stood out to Ebocwa. "Among the many things that have touched my heart is the training on environmental protection because I used to go into the forest and cut down trees, which destroyed the environment. Because of that, I decided to start planting trees all around," he shared.



Ebocwa was so moved by this new knowledge that when he remembered all the deforestation he had seen back in the Democratic Republic of Congo, he wished CWS could exist there too to spread this same knowledge and reduce harm to the environment.

Beyond learning to care for Mother Earth, Ebocwa improved his relationship with another mother: the mother of his children and beloved wife, Nadia. "Because of the gender equality training we received, I am doing this work with my wife and my children." He added that anytime he needs to make a decision, now he makes it together with his wife. The couple has been so successful that they are seen as role models by the other couples in the program.

Your support helped empower Ebocwa and his family. They have moved into a better home, surrounded by a flourishing garden that feeds them every day. Their harvest is so abundant that they can share with their neighbors and sell to other families. Ebocwa also shared that before the program, his children faced malnutrition and various illnesses due to a lack of diverse nutrition. Now they are healthy and strong, with everything he needs to care for his family available in his backyard.

From chopping down trees to planting them, Ebocwa has grown in many ways. With each seed he and Nadia plant together, they are growing hope and caring for the place we all call home. Thanks to your generosity, families like Ebocwa's can create a more sustainable future. ☺

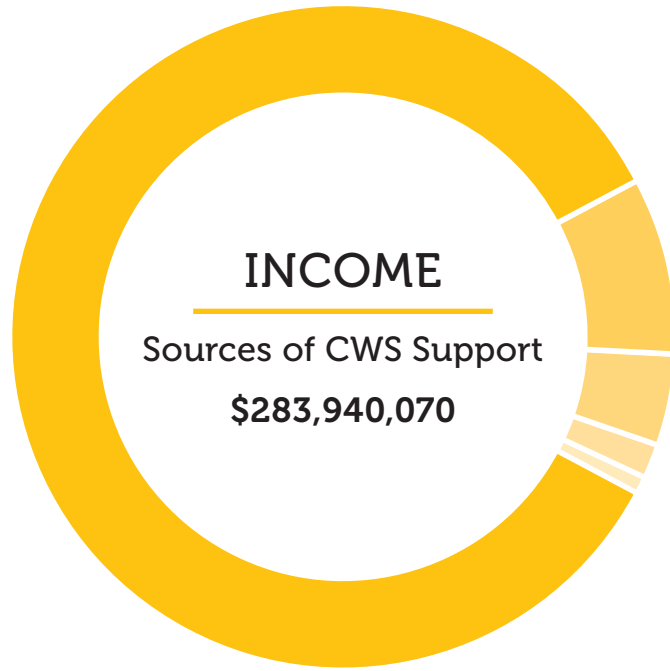
